
Part 2. The Nature and Work of God

Lesson 1: God in Three Persons

Lesson Summary

The doctrine of the Trinity teaches that the one true God eternally exists as three coequal and coeternal Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit (Matt. 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14). While the term "Trinity" is not found in Scripture, the truth is revealed throughout both Old and New Testaments. Distinctions among the Persons are seen in passages where the Lord is distinguished from the Lord (Gen. 19:24), the Redeemer from the Lord (Isa. 59:20), and the Spirit from the Lord (Isa. 48:16). Orthodox Christianity affirms this biblical view, rejecting heresies such as modalism (God as one Person appearing in different modes) and polytheism (belief in multiple gods). Revelation 12–13 describes Satan's counterfeit, the "unholy trinity" of the Dragon (Satan), the Beast (Antichrist), and the False Prophet, who imitate God to deceive. Unlike the Holy Trinity, marked by truth and life, the counterfeit system is marked by deception, rebellion, and destruction. Yet Scripture promises that God will judge and defeat this false trinity, and His Kingdom will prevail (Dan. 7:21–22; Rev. 20:10).

- 5. **Q:** How does God ultimately deal with Satan's counterfeit system? **A:** He defeats and judges them, giving the Kingdom to His saints (Dan. 7:21–22; Rev. 20:10).

The Trinity reveals the mystery of the one true God—Father, Son, and Spirit—while Satan's counterfeit is destined for defeat.
