Lesson 4: The Work of the Holy Spirit – The Two Aspects

Lesson Summary

Scripture reveals that the **Holy Spirit** works in **two complementary aspects**: the **inward aspect for life** and the **outward aspect for power** (John 7:37–39; Acts 1:8). Inwardly, the Spirit indwells every believer, giving spiritual life, regenerating the heart, and conforming us to Christ's image (John 20:22; Rom. 8:9–11). Outwardly, the Spirit empowers believers for witness and service, clothing them with power from on high (Luke 24:49; Acts 2:4). The baptism in the Holy Spirit is a completed, historical act at Pentecost (1 Cor. 12:13), shared by the whole Body of Christ, while fresh fillings of the Spirit provide ongoing empowerment for ministry (Acts 4:31). Speaking in tongues is not required as universal evidence; instead, the Spirit manifests in diverse ways to build up the Church (1 Cor. 12:29–30). Believers experience this inheritance by standing rightly in the Body of Christ, receiving by faith, and yielding to His Word (Eph. 5:18). God's ultimate goal is inward transformation, and His outward empowerment serves to advance His mission.
