Lesson 4: Salvation's Assurance

Lesson Summary

True assurance of salvation begins with the **new birth**—being born again by the Spirit through repentance and faith in Christ (John 3:3–7). This spiritual birth creates a new nature (2 Cor. 5:17), secures our eternal status in God's family (Rev. 21:27), and begins a lifelong journey of growth. Salvation is not earned, maintained, or repeated—it is a once-for-all gift of God's grace (Eph. 2:8–9). Baptism is a command of Christ, not an option, serving as the outward testimony of inward transformation (Matt. 28:19–20). By immersion, it symbolizes death, burial, and resurrection with Christ (Rom. 6:4–7). Though baptism does not save, delayed obedience weakens assurance. Assurance itself rests not on feelings or works but on God's promises: eternal life to all who believe (John 3:16; Rom. 10:9–10; Eph. 1:13). Believers can walk in confidence, knowing they are sealed by the Spirit, secured by the Son, and loved by the Father.
