Lesson 3: The Narrow and Wide Gates

Lesson Summary

In Matthew 7:13–14, Jesus presents a sobering choice between two gates, two paths, and two destinies: one leading to life, the other to destruction. The wide gate is popular, comfortable, and inclusive, but it ends in eternal ruin. The narrow gate is hard, exclusive, and costly, but it alone leads to eternal life.

The gate is narrow because sin has separated humanity from God (Isa. 59:2), and only Jesus, through His cross, provides the way back (John 14:6; Acts 4:12). To walk the narrow path means continual repentance, surrender, and daily dying to self (Luke 9:23; Gal. 2:20).

Few choose it because the broad way promises ease and popularity, but true discipleship requires sacrifice and transformation (Rom. 12:1–2). The narrow way produces godly fruit (Matt. 7:15–20; Gal. 5:22–23), while the broad way results in decay and destruction.

Christ not only opened the gate—He walks with us on the road and leads us home to eternal life.
